L5P Mini-Precinct At Risk

As neighbors in Candler Park may or may not know, the Atlanta Police Mini-Precinct in Little 5 Points is about to begin its 7th year of operation. However, this year we have some concerns regarding its future. We are definitely about to have a major reduction in police coverage for our community, for two reasons. First, you should be aware that Zone 6 (the division of the Police Department that covers our community) is being expanded; it will now include several other neighborhoods, some of them high crime areas. However, there will not be an increase in Zone 6 Police officers-thus thinner coverage for us. Also, you should be aware that the Sembler Company has approached zone six about moving the precinct to their development. We, of course, hope to keep it in L5P.

This satellite police station has been a public/private partnership between the City of Atlanta and the community. The Police Dept. provides the officers, equipment, supplies, video surveillance, etc. The community provided the funds to renovate the space and continues to pay for rent, utilities and other operating costs.

The bulk of the Mini-Precinct's funding comes from L5P Business Association members and substantial contributions from the Neighborhood Organizations.

We have requested a \$1,000 contribution from CPNO, which will be voted on at our December meeting.

When we first opened this local police station, there was an enormous amount of financial support from the community. And there still is great support. However, over the years the contributions have dwindled as people

get comfortable with the increased level of safety. (Remember when Little 5 Points was considered dangerous and Buckhead was considered safe?) This attrition of funds is putting the continued operation of the L5P Mini-Precinct at risk.

We are guaranteed a higher police presence in the area with the L5P Mini-Precinct. Besides police officers assigned to staff the Mini-Precinct and the Zone 6 bicycle and motorcycle patrols now based there, many other officers often stop by to get supplies, make reports, take a break or get a snack. This creates a large police presence in L5P and our community as police travel through going to and from this facility. The Mini-Precinct is also a convenient place where citizens can meet and exchange information with police.

We ask for you to support the contribution of \$1,000 from CPNO and also to consider personally joining the several hundred of your neighbors who have been supporting this worthwhile endeavor. We need your help. A yearly contribution of \$35 or more is suggested.

Piedmont Park Parking Deck Proposal

Most of us have experienced the frustration of finding a parking space when we drive to visit Piedmont Park. This regional public park (listed on the National Register of Historic Spaces) celebrated its 100th anniversary this year, and its popularity continues to grow.

Recently, the Atlanta Botanical Garden and the Piedmont Park Conservancy proposed to build a six-story, 800-space parking deck inside the park, presumably in an effort to increase access to this crown jewel of Atlanta's city park system. However this simple plan has turned out to be very controversial.

Is a plan that results in increased automobile traffic, noise, and pollution inside a park appropriate? Is the removal of approximately 80 mature trees an acceptable loss? Or is it only fair to local residents to provide visitors with an alternative to parking on their neighborhood streets? And is the

construction of this deck necessary to assure access for all Atlanta residents, not just those fortunate enough to live within walking distance?

Piedmont Park belongs to all of us, and we have a say in how it is maintained and developed. All twenty-four of Atlanta's Neighborhood Planning Units (NPUs) will vote on the proposal in the next few months, and our NPU-N representative Walt Weimar wants to make sure that his vote is representative of the neighborhood's opinions.

In order for us to learn more details about the plan and to make a more informed decision, I have invited representatives from both the Piedmont Park Conservancy and the Friends of Piedmont Park to attend our December CPNO meeting. They will present their arguments for and against the deck and answer any questions. I hope you will attend.

Save The Candler Park Pool

Ah, the cool blue water of Candler Park Pool in the summer... but, what's this? Oh, no! It's actually not blue... but RED?

It's true. In the five years that the Candler Park Pool has been under neighborhood control, it's been operating in the red. We've had some very nice members indeed who have made donations at the close of each season thus far. However, these "angels" have come to the ends of their philanthropic resources. The time has come for the pool to "sink or swim."

Don't get us wrong. We've made a ton of progress, and built the operating position of the pool up substantially from where we started. In fact, the 2004 swim season saw a 10% increase in pool membership for the fourth straight year in a row – but this is still 50 members short of break-even funding for standard pool operations. We've also staged a fair number of moderately to extremely successful fundraisers (such as the BBQ at the Pool, the Shrimp Boil, Pizza at the Pool and

Dive-In Movies). These have added much to the kitty, and should have gotten us close to break-even this year.

However, City of Atlanta Schools started back up two full weeks earlier than normal, representing a loss of nearly \$2,000 (the pool can't be open when school is in session). Overall bad weather throughout the summer also put a damper on pay swim revenues. The net result is that the Candler Park Pool is already in a deficit position even before the new season begins in May.

This is where you come in. We're asking that the CPNO make an investment that will keep the pool viable for the 2005 season. We've worked hard to make the pool a neighborhood amenity – let's not lose it. Please be sure to attend the December CPNO meeting and let your voice be heard to save the Candler Park Pool.

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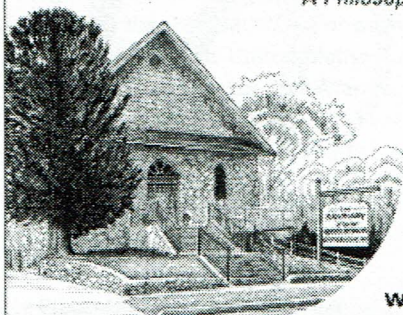
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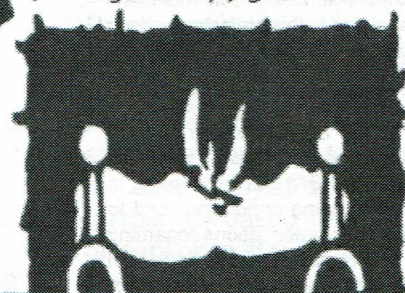


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Scrooge Takes Barefoot Neighbor Point One Step Further?

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LAND USE ISSUES

There are no land use issues scheduled to be voted on at the December CPNO meeting. Land use issues to be voted on at the January meeting must be submitted prior to December 26. Below are issues of which we should be aware.

Piedmont Park Parking Deck - a resolution regarding the proposed Piedmont Park garage deck, for which NPU-N will need a recommendation from Candler Park at its January 2005 meeting, should be expected from an advisory committee headed by Amy Stout (404-371-0505)

Moreland Avenue / L5P Development -- Candler Park residents along Josephine Street have recently considered the need for dialogue with principals or agents of proposed redevelopment, possibly as a strip shopping center, along the east side of Moreland Avenue, between Front Page News/Tijuana Garage on the north, and an existing coin laundromat on the south. Any residents interested in issues related to this project may learn more by contacting Jeb Brees at 404-434-2548.

1642 Clifton Terrace -- Anyone interested in a potential multi-family redevelopment at 1642 Clifton Terrace, an advisory group led by CPNO VP Julia Brooke (404-373-3991) will work to determine current zoning conditions, and to possibly develop recommendations regarding any nearby property owner concerns (which may include issues presented by members of adjacent Druid Hills Civic Association or Lake Claire Neighbors).

NPU-N ISSUES

NPU-N meetings are held at 7PM, on the 4th Thursday of every month -- except again this month when they'll be the 3rd Thursday -- 12/16 at Epworth Methodist Church. Candler Park residents are welcome to attend. Contact NPU-N representative Walt Weimar regarding any regularly-scheduled voting or agenda matters.

Comprehensive Development Plan -- Two final public workshops for the 2005-2020 City of Atlanta Comprehensive Development Plan will be held from 10 AM to 12 Noon on Saturday, December 11, 2004 (regarding Economic Development) and Saturday, January 22, 2005 (regarding Transportation and Land Use) at Old City Council Chambers.

Atlanta Municipal Court Weekender Program -- Community Court Division of the Atlanta Municipal Court has advised NPU-N of the Weekender Program for community service projects utilizing supervised low-level offenders for projects with neighborhood groups such as park clean-ups scheduled for Saturdays. 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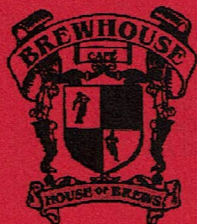
